

The raised beds and barbecue have ensured a greater involvement in the garden at Hopeman and the hope is by summer they will see the seeds blooming in full colour with their vegetables being ready to help with their healthy eating approach.

The successful bid from Glasgow East demonstrates a real group approach and is focussed on a steering group approach where the individuals from Glasgow East will be fully involved in planning and shaping their spending / plans. The range of activities that have already happened and are planned reflects the choices of individuals within Glasgow East around what they believe offers FUN!!!

The group is also ensuring that the money received as part of the successful bid is used throughout the year which means the FUN can last longer. I was part of the steering group which organised the Participatory Funding Event. The group met fortnightly at Park Circus in the run up to the event on the 7th June 2013. The steering group was used to help support individuals to think about how they wanted to present their idea on the day. I initially went along with staff then went a few times myself too which was great for my confidence. I'm really glad I got involved and got to see the whole thing through to the end.

I took the steering group information back to Balmoral Gate and spoke about it at our house meetings. At the house meetings we discussed different pitch ideas and initially decided to go for a day out at Go Ape. Afterwards we realised Go Ape wasn't suitable for everyone in the service and we had always wanted to pick something that everyone in the service could attend. We then came up with the idea of visiting the Highlands as we had travelled to lots of places in Scotland on our daytrips but the Highlands were always out of reach because of the distance and cost.

I volunteered to pitch at the event and Susan, the Senior Support Worker, helped me to create the pitch. We did this together in the staff office and I practiced a few times with different staff. We wanted to stand out on the day so decided that we would all wear 'See you Jimmy' hats, have Scotland flags painted on our cheeks and wear either red or blue clothing. Abigail, Support Practitioner, painted a banner which we displayed at our stall. We picked the title 'Highland Fling' as we thought it was catchy and everyone liked it.

On the day I braved the challenge and pitched the Highland Fling idea on my own. I was third to pitch and felt really nervous as I have never spoke in front of so many people before and it was a big crowd! I got lots of encouragement from staff before I went up, which was really nice and everyone congratulated me afterwards. I felt relieved after I had done it and really glad that it went well. When I heard we won the money I felt elated that I had really achieved something for everyone!





Even if we hadn't got any money I'm glad I took part in the whole process as I gained a lot from the experience and I would definitely do it again! I would highly recommend this to other individuals as it's a great self esteem and confidence builder.

On the 14th August we went on our Highland Fling trip with our £2000 winnings. This was a mini bus tour with an overnight stay in Inverness. We were picked up at 9am from the service by our tour guide and driver Alan, who was dressed for the occasion in a kilt.



We went to Dunkeld and enjoyed views of the River Tay and visited the cathedral. We then went on to Pitlochory for lunch and a walk around the local shops. Afterwards we went to the Bruar Falls, which were magnificent! I've never seen water so clear in my life. It was like the Timotei advert from the telly! The views over the whole falls were stunning and well worth the climb to see them.




